Y12 Sport Science - The Sport Science students were introduced to what a typical field study might look like this week. ALL STUDENTS:

Please be thinking about what you can be doing over the April Break and the long holiday starting in June to keep you on track. <u>The Pre-College Program Digest</u> has links to experiences that can help with resume and skill building as well as college and country research. It is a great resource to refer to as new information is continually being added. Make sure BridgeU is as up-to-date as possible.

Y12:

Consider <u>registering for the May 6 SAT</u> (April 21 registration deadline) if you are planning to apply to colleges in the U.S.A. <u>Please make sure to schedule an SAT Registration</u> 'Looking Ahead' Meeting with me for sometime in April or May if you haven't already done so. Before our meeting, please <u>review this slideshow</u> that reminds you of the things you should be doing before the end of the school year and have family discussions about issues on the slideshow. After you have done these two things, please <u>make an appointment</u> with me to talk about your plans. This meeting can be done as a family or just with students.

Y10:

Make sure you have completed the recent BridgeU registration that has been sent to you if have not already done so. This is important to do now as you will be receiving interest inventories and career-search information when you return from break, and you will need to have your BridgeU profile active to do this.

<u>Class Trip Year 11</u>

Last Wednesday, the Year 11 students and I&S teachers went on a field trip to Never Ending Food Farm and Moyo Farm to learn more about permaculture and its role in food sustainability in Malawi.

The first farm they went to was Never Ending Food Farm. There they met Kristof, the owner of the farm and a wonderfully friendly guide. He kindly showed the Year 11s around, introducing them to the various zones around his farm. The greenery surrounding them was abundant as trees towered over the students, watching as they explored the rest of the farm. As the Year 11s walked through the farm, they were greeted by plants of all different kinds: sunflowers, maize, beans, and many, many more. Along with the plants, they met many animals along their way such as playful dogs, busy chickens, leaping catfish, and MANY spiders. Apart from the plants and animals, Kristof taught the Year 11s a lot about implementing permaculture to sustain a community, explaining the nuances of a post-colonial world and Malawian agriculture. The Year 11 students and teachers were sad to, finally, leave the farm, but excited to see the next farm that awaited.

After a quick bus ride, the they arrived at Moyo Farm. They were promptly greeted by a large, friendly black dog named Bentley and his owner, Marcel. Thereafter Bentley became the group's companion, following them wherever they went (much to some fearful Year 11's despair). Moyo Farm was intricately designed to sustain the owner and his business but provided aesthetically pleasing visuals to the teachers and students at the farm. However, Moyo Farm was not just made to look pretty as the crops grown at the farm were admirable as well. Moyo Farm grew bananas, passion fruit, air potatoes, and many more. On the way, the Year 11s met the animals kept on the farm: bees, worms, spiders, and fish. In addition to having the privilege to see so many wonderful things, Marcel explained the business and economic aspects of investing in permaculture, while the Year 11 students listened and eagerly gorged themselves on the farm's passion fruit.

Grateful and with full bellies, the Year 11 students and teachers went back to campus with smiles on their faces and an overflowing bank of knowledge on permaculture at the front of their minds.
