Now that our STUCO core have been elected, the next step is for our class representatives to be elected, so that the student voice is well represented across Secondary. The teacher STUCO advisors have shared some more information below:

Student Council Class Representative Elections for Years 7-11 will be held on Thursday, October 28th, during Tutor.

Each tutor group will elect a Class Representative (Class Rep) that will represent their class in the Secondary Student Council. Students are encouraged to come up with a short speech that includes:

- Their vision
- What qualities they bring to the role
- · Why their class mates should vote for them

After speeches, the class participates in an anonymous voting process.

Below is STUCO's Purpose and description of the Class Rep's duties.

### **STUCO Purpose:**

The purpose of the Student Council shall be to serve the student body of Bishop Mackenzie International Secondary School, voice student opinions to the administration and school board, to raise funds for various student body and campus needs, and to aid in student awareness of youth, community and world concerns.

### Class Representatives:

- Represents and advocates for their tutor group
- Regularly attends and contributes to Student Council meetings
- Communicates frequently, information from the Student Council to their class
- Assists in the planning and carrying out of Student Council events and fundraisers

# **Biology! Biology! Biology!**

As you know, last week we celebrated all things biology during Biology Week. Year 11 student, Victoria Nakhumwa shares her experience of an infectious diseases talk that she attended during this event:

"During Bio Week, Dr. Melissa Reimer-McAtee came and spoke to Y11 about all aspects of infectious disease including some of the most important discoveries and developments in this field such as Robert Koch's identification of bacteria under a microscope and Alexander Fleming's discovery of penicillin. During this discussion we learned more about the history of HIV/AIDS treatment and how it has developed over the years as well as some of the less recognized infections and diseases globally such as a mosquito transmitted disease called Filarskis and numerous parasitic infections. This discussion helped us better appreciate treatment and prevention methods used, and allowed us to be more aware of the less recognized and funded diseases that can be just as debilitating as the more known diseases and infections."



### Inclusion

Over the last two weeks our teachers in Secondary (and Primary) have been meeting with Dr Belinda Karge, who is leading our inclusion audit.

MYP and DP teachers, as well as our student support teams, each met with Belinda to share what we are doing well, and reflect on areas for growth and improvement.
