I+S in Year 11

Year 11 student, Marco Wheeler, shares an update on his class' current I+S Development Unit:

This term in Individuals & Societies we have been looking at development, in this unit, we have explored the concept of development from a variety of angles, with a focus on sub-Saharan Africa. Initially, we familiarised ourselves with key terms and ideas through reading part of Walter Rodney's "How Europe Underdeveloped Africa" and furthered our understanding through holding a productive group discussion.

From this point, we wanted to dive deeper to examine disparities between different areas within the region. Each person investigated a different country within their group's region (West, East, Central, or Southern) and gathered statistics pertaining to a variety of factors related to development as a whole, like GDP per capita or literacy rate. With this, we created graphs to help visualise the trends and presented all our findings to the class. Overall, our work in this unit has helped develop our development knowledge, specifically with regards to the effect of colonisation and the interconnectedness of everything.










Term 3 ECP!


Being left behind is also challenging, as students lose friendships and receive new people into the community year after year. Staying students also need time to say goodbye, are are encouraged to join this program.



Womanifesto: Pad and tampon drive

Womanifesto is a CAS project started by Y13 students (Takondwa, Skyla, Adaeze, Faith and Sarah), to help provide period products to the secondary girl's bathrooms. After interviewing different year groups the Womanifesto group discovered that many girls in BMIS were uncomfortable with walking all the way to the nurse's office for a pad. In order to make the bathrooms a more comfortable and safe place, we have decided to hold a sanitary product drive where we will be collecting sanitary products in boxes placed in each of the girls' bathrooms. We are also holding a talk with the 7-9 girls about UTIs, period, and consent. From Monday 28th March to Thursday 31st March, we will hold a period products drive where students bring in period products (e.g. pads, tampons, wet wipes, etc.). These products should be placed in boxes, located in the girl's bathrooms. Everyone is encouraged to participate!
