Students took part in the World Kindness Challenge in January 2020. All week long students focused on how to be kind to oneself and others, and the environment. Students counted their acts of kindness and created colorful paper chains showing all of the acts of kindness that primary students completed. The kindness chains decorated the cafeteria area for the remainder of the year. All students knew that "kindness matters" and that "BMIS cares".

All year long, teachers and teaching assistants engaged in professional development opportunities in order to reflect on our teaching practice and continue to impact student learning in a positive way. Maths became one of our focuses this year and we had the chance to work with Dr. Karim Letwinsky to review our math practice and start thinking about where we wanted to go next.

All these wonderful moments happened between August 2019 and March 2020. With COVID-19 impacting the entire world, we had to make some changes to our life at school. The first and biggest change was that we transitioned to Distance Learning. Teachers had been working diligently in the background

weeks ahead of the transition to get everything ready. We had a single parent evening to present to parents the PYP Distance Learning platform and then started this new way of learning and teaching. Distance Learning was new to all of us. Families had to manage their everyday lives in order to juggle work, school life and family life. Teachers had to reinvent their practice and come up with innovative ways to teach and support their students from far. Everybody gave their very best and supported one another when needed. Continuous feedback was a key to make Distance Learning as successful as could be. Students finished their school year still in Distance Learning. After 11 weeks of this approach, it is safe to say that the entire BMIS community learned a lot during this time. All of this new knowledge, skills, and conceptual understandings and the development of many attitudes and attributes will help everyone to move forward in our learning journey at BMIS.

The school year ended with some memorable experiences. We wrote history when launching BMIS's first Year 6 PYP Exhibition online. Year 6 students and teachers were risk-takers when finding ways to present their learning to the entire school community, using Padlets and the PYP Exhibition platform to make this happen. The PYP Exhibition night started with an online evening in which we celebrated our students' amazing successes.

And it didn't stop there. We also hosted the Year 6 graduation at BMIS virtually. Over 180 guests were a part of this special evening where we looked back to see how far our Year 6 students had come. We celebrated memories, listened to inspirational speeches from our STUCO members, gave out the PYP certificates and the Head Teacher Awards and had time to dance and cheer online for the Year 6 students who will now move on to Secondary School.

Our year ended with an End of Year Assembly in which students performed dances, musical pieces and songs. Teachers put together inspirational messages for students to wish them well for their future. Mr. Bishop, our Director, shared some wise words and we had the opportunity to say goodbye to all of our leaving students and teachers. And even if we couldn't sit in the Upper Hall for this assembly, we still felt connected as we could all watch the assembly and admire the creative contributions that students and teachers made to create a memorable day.

So as we look back to all of our achievements, I think that we have a lot to be proud of. Together we walked this path full of adventures, together we faced and overcame challenges, and together climbed many mountains, supporting one another, knowing that we are stronger together. So thank you for an amazing year at BMIS. I look forward to seeing what next year will bring.

We wish them all the best for this big transition into Year One and look forward to catching up with them around the school. - Lucy Piper, Cheryl Thom, Alice Leaper




























PYP PHE

We had a very fun and active year in PYP PHE

Reception students explored and manipulated different materials and equipment through movement exploration. They incorporated scarves, balloons, ribbons, and hula hoops to do this.

Year 1 students enjoyed their fundamental movement skills (FMS), as they could now see the importance of different movements, this included skipping, hopping, side sliding, bear crawling, running, galloping, hopping and jumping.

Year 2 students have learned multiple different dancing moves and animal movements to express their emotions. Students' main focus during this time was on their spatial awareness when moving in different areas.

Year 3 students quickly blended into the routine of the Upper Primary as they realised the importance of time keeping when changing for PE lessons and also teamwork, risk taking and enthusiasm. This was seen as they enjoyed their first ever swimming gala.

Year 4 students learned all about well-being. They explored how various body systems work and as well as various fitness activities. We dove into the digestive system and explored dynamic (moving) warms ups and various body weight exercises.

Year 5 students enjoyed their team games lessons in the year as they worked to improve their shooting, passing, and dribbling skills in hockey and basketball. They further inquired into the importance of team work including communication which is used throughout all PHE units and a life skill.

Year 6 students started their transition to secondary school. During our movement composition unit students helped create the statement of inquiry as well as some of the summative assessment criteria. In small groups they collaborated to plan and perform a movement composition routine, having the option to incorporate hula hoops, skipping ropes, and various gymnastics/tumbling skills.

Students also reflected on their group collaboration to get ready for MYP next year.







Service Learning

Eco Warriors:

This year, the Eco Warriors club has been running multiple projects simultaneously as a means of expanding our reach within the BMIS community. The club is split in three core divisions, each focusing on a different aspect of environmental change.




















Swimming
