




#### Interact

# Field trips!

It's so exciting to see field trips returning to BMIS, which really helps students see the real world connection to what they are learning in the classroom. Individuals and Societies teacher, Angelica Jones, shares:

The Year 11 Individuals and Societies class is currently exploring the unit on Food Sustainability and the different factors affecting food insecurity around the world. On December 1st, we had the wonderful opportunity to visit Neverending Food centre and Moyo Farm around Lilongwe. We learned more about Permaculture (permanent agriculture) practices and how these farming approaches are part of the solution to the food shortage issues in the world. Our hosts, Kristoff and Marcel, gave us a comprehensive tour of their farms, shared their knowledge of nutrition, natural resource management, waste reduction and potential economic development opportunities from adopting a sustainable farming approach. Students really enjoyed the experience and some had fun handling worm compost, testing the right algae level in the water and learning about compostable toilet waste! Definitely a fantastic example of learning outside the classroom.











## More field trips!

Business Management teacher, Angelica Jones shares:

Our Year 13 Business Management and Design Technology class visited Ener-g-Africa last week to have a real life experience on methods of production, sustainable production management decisions and design processes. During the tour of the factory students observed the manufacturing of high efficiency stove components, learned about inventory systems and the implication of operation management's decisions on various business functions such as Marketing, Human Resource Management and Finance. This visit was a unique opportunity for students to learn more about the business environment in Malawi and the benefits and limitations of managing a multinational organization in the country. On our return, the bus was beaming with interesting observations on economic policy, business strategy and the impact organizations have in local communities.

#### **ManageBac**

A reminder that all of our parents and guardians have access to ManageBac, where they can see their child's classes, messages, assessment grades, and report cards (among other things!). There is a ManageBac app that you are able to download (check out your app store), so you can have easy access to your child's learning and progress.

Some parents shared that the interface has recently changed, and that they weren't sure where to find their child's grades

Parents can see all grades for their children's tasks from their Dashboard. Scroll down to the Classes section and on the desired Subject, click on Tasks. This will show Upcoming tasks first, followed by all Completed tasks and, if graded, their grades. Please see attached screen recording as an example.



#### **Term 2 ECP: An update from our ECP Coordinator Nate Cole**

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Planning is underway for our Term 2 Extended Curriculum Program (ECP), which will begin on January 24th. The schedule will be finalized over the next few weeks and will be shared with students and families on January 18th. Sign-ups will occur that day as well. We did also want to preview some changes that will be taking place for secondary ECP (see below). Our goal is to improve and maximize the number of activities that we can provide so that students have as much opportunity as possible to experience the benefits of our activities.

- We will be running two separate sessions on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays (2-3 pm and 3-4 pm) as we seek to double the opportunities for students to participate in ECP!
- We will be bringing in some outside providers to help us expand our options.
- We are hoping to add sessions for Wednesdays as well, including cricket, Chichewa, "Cultural Chameleon Club" for "Third Culture Kids" and University Transitions Workshops for Year 13 students. (Wednesday sessions will likely have limited spots.)
- Year 7-9 and Year 10-13 students will be grouped together, as per our new Covid protocols and to maximize options for students.
- Activities will include: football, netball, basketball, rugby, maths and Spanish help, School Production, music, band, yoga, wood-carving, tennis, golf, Eco Aware, biology and chemistry help, orienteering, ultimate frisbee, dance, chess, and hopefully more!

Finally, we can always use a few more **volunteer** instructors or coaches to help lead additional ECP activities. We would like to extend an **invitation** to any **parents** or **guardians** who have experience and/or expertise in a particular area and may have a particular interest or talent they would like to share.
